DEVOTIONAL: "HAVE YOU BEEN SAVED?"

In our largely Protestant (and Evangelical) culture, Catholics can sometimes be confronted with the question, "Have you been saved?!" To a cradle Catholic who has not received apologetics in this area, this may seem like an odd question. The Evangelical is basing his belief on the doctrine of "once saved, always saved", otherwise known as eternal security. This holds that once a person genuinely accepts Christ as their personal Savior and repents of their past sins, nothing can keep him from going to heaven upon death. All sins committed after being "saved" do not affect one's eternal destination. Even the total renunciation of Christ does not disqualify a person from eternal life, in their view. This doctrine is related to the Protestant affirmation of "grace alone", meaning that works have nothing to do with our salvation, since we are saved by God's grace alone.

How Biblical is this concept, though? Some verses appear to affirm eternal security, such as, "My sheep hear my voice, and I know them, and they follow me. I give them eternal life, and they will never perish, and no one will snatch them out of my hand. My Father, who has given them to me, is greater than all, and no one is able to snatch them out of the Father's hand. I and the Father are one. (John 10:27-30)" However, we must look to context and the Bible as a whole, instead of relying on proof texts given by our opponents. Here are a few counterexamples: "But the one who endures to the end is the one who will be saved. (Matthew 24:13)"; "For the word of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to those <u>who are being saved</u> it is the power of God. (1 Corinthians 1:18)"; "...so that, after I have preached to others, I myself will not be <u>disqualified</u>. (1 Corinthians 9:27)"; "What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if you say you have faith but do not have works?...So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead. (James 2:14,17)"; etc.

In the month devoted to the souls in purgatory, it is fitting to respond to the Evangelical enquiry with, "I was saved through baptism, I'm being saved through the sacraments, and I have the hope that I will be saved in


the end." Our religion is a relationship with the living God, and God deigns to give us free will to determine if we continue to accept Him or not.

Let us pray: Oh my Jesus, forgive us our sins, save us from the fires of hell, lead all souls to Heaven, especially those most in need of Thy mercy. Amen.

DISTRICT DEPUTY INPUT

Our Catholic faith is central to the Knights of Columbus. In the days of the separate 3rd Degree Exemplification, we were asked many questions about the central tenants of our Catholic faith.

One of those important questions was, "What are the Precepts of the Catholic faith." In the past, Knights were expected to know them. Please take this opportunity to review Catholic Precepts. Here they are from Loyola Press.

As early as the fourth century, we see the Church insisting that its members behave in certain ways: They were to attend Mass on Sundays and special feasts, receive the sacraments of Reconciliation and Eucharist, and not get married during Advent and Lent.

By the end of the Middle Ages, there was a consensus that Catholics were obliged to perform certain practices. Saint Peter Canisius, writing in 1555, listed five precepts, and his list is used in Germany and Latin America. Saint Robert Bellarmine, writing in 1589, listed six precepts, and his list is followed in France and Italy. The Baltimore Catechism used in the United States listed six precepts, and the 1992 Catechism of the Catholic Church lists five precepts.

Whatever their number, the purpose of the precepts has always been to preserve good order in the Church, to maintain discipline within the Church, and to establish a specific Catholic identity.

The Precepts of the Church describe the minimum effort we must make in prayer and in living a moral life. All Catholics are called to move beyond the minimum by growing in love of God and love of neighbor.

The Precepts are as follows:

- 1. Attendance at Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation
- 2. Confession of serious sin at least once a year
- 3. Reception of Holy Communion at least once a year during the Easter season
- 4. Observance of the days of fast and abstinence
- 5. Providing for the needs of the Church
